Hidden, speculative & volunteering opportunities

A speculative application involves approaching an employer about an opportunity which has not been advertised to enquire if there are any potential positions (such as placement, work experience, job shadowing or graduate job) – now or in the future. Not all job opportunities are advertised, indeed it is estimated that up to 70% of jobs are secured via the "hidden market". This hidden market refers to employers filling vacancies through head-hunting, verbal informal advertising or utilising potential candidates who have been "on file". Tapping into the hidden market requires a proactive approach which can be achieved through networking or making a speculative application.

There are different ways to make a speculative approach: writing to or emailing the organisation; telephoning; face to face and social media. Employers would prefer to see periods of volunteering, rather than long periods of unemployment or inactivity. Do not over commit, leaving little time to apply for permanent jobs. However, it can be a great way to gain interesting additional experience.
